Springs Soccer Club stands as a local beacon of excellence in youth development. Founded just four short years ago, it guickly became one of the most influential youth programs in the community and is Coral Springs' sole recognized travel soccer program. From its humble start with three teams, SSC has grown significantly, now fielding approximately 36 teams. Coach Matey Mateev is the NPL Boys Director, in which the boys 2011, 2010 teams are currently leading the league and in first place and the 2007 boys are in second place. This is a great accomplishment and testament to the SSC and coaching staff.

SSC is eagerly anticipating its upcoming College ID Camp for girls and boys, which will take place on March 23-24. This event will provide college coaches with the opportunity to scout players and simultaneously expose players to college-level training sessions.

SSC has hired multiple female coaches and sees an increasing number of young female players each year, which is a reflection of the club's commitment to fostering a diverse and inclusive soccer community. The club takes great strides in developing female role models, building up young girls, and supporting pathways for both genders through high school and into college.

Beyond developing skills on the field, SSC instills

essential values such as character, connection, competence, competitiveness, and confidence in its players. Through a holistic approach to player development, the club aims to inspire players to become the best versions of themselves. Players are encouraged to take ownership of their development, fostering a growth mindset that will serve them well in soccer and in life.

To support this mission, SSC emphasizes the critical role parents play in their child's develop-Aligning players. ment. coaches, and families is necessary to create a culture that is supportive of each player's individual success, and the success of the club.

Bumps on your Dog: Types and Treatment Options

Subcutaneous cysts, also known as sebaceous cysts, are a common occurrence in pet dogs. These cysts develop beneath the skin and can vary in size, shape, and content. While they are usually benign, they can sometimes cause discomfort or become infected if left untreated. Understanding the different types of subcutaneous cysts and their proper treatment is essential for maintaining the health and well-being of our furry companions.

One of the most common types of subcutaneous cysts found in dogs is the sebaceous cyst. Sebaceous cysts are filled with a cheesy or oily substance called sebum, which is produced by the sebaceous glands in the skin. These

cysts typically appear as small, round lumps beneath the skin and are usually harmless. However, they can become inflamed or infected, leading to pain, swelling, and discharge.

Another type of subcutaneous cyst commonly found is the follicular cyst. Follicular cysts develop from hair follicles and can vary in size from small to large. They may contain hair or other debris and can sometimes become infected, causing irritation and discomfort for the dog.

Epidermoid cysts are also seen in dogs and are formed from cells that

are normally found on the surface of the skin. These cysts are typically filled with a white, cheesy material and may become inflamed or infected if they rupture or are irritated.

Lipomas are another type of common subcutaneous cyst. Unlike sebaceous cysts, lipomas are composed of fatty tissue and are usually soft and movable beneath the skin. While lipomas are generally benign, they can grow quite large and may need to be surgically removed if they cause discomfort or interfere with the dog's movement.

Treatment for subcutaneous cysts varies depending on the type and severity of the cyst. In many cases, small, asymptomatic cysts may not require any treatment at all and can be monitored for changes over time. However, if a cyst becomes inflamed, infected, or causes discomfort for your

pet, veterinary intervention may be necessary.

One common treatment option for subcutaneous cysts is drainage and flushing of the cyst. This procedure involves making a small incision in the skin to drain the contents of the cyst and flush out any debris or infection. In some cases, the cyst may need to be lanced multiple times to ensure that it is completely drained.

Surgical removal of the cyst may be necessary in cases where the cyst is large, painful, or causing other complications. During this procedure, the veterinarian will carefully excise the cyst from beneath the skin and suture the incision closed. Surgery is usually performed under general anesthesia to minimize discomfort for the dog.

> In addition to drainage and surgery, other treatment options for subcutaneous cysts may include antibiotics to treat any underlying infection, antiinflammatory medications to reduce swelling and pain, and topical treatments to promote healing. It's essential to follow your veterinarian's recommendations for treatment and monitoring to ensure the best possible outcome for your pet.

> Dr. Mark Stevens from Stevens animal Hospital in Pompano Beach addressed the issue. "If you notice a bump or swelling that you haven't

noticed before, it may need to be seen by your Veterinarian. It could be something as simple as a cyst or mole, or a more serious issue such as an early mass or tumor. Your Veterinarian will be able to advise you on the proper action to take."

In conclusion, subcutaneous cysts are a common occurrence in pet dogs and can vary in type and severity. While many cysts are benign and may not require treatment, others can become inflamed, infected, or cause discomfort for the dog. Understanding the different types of subcutaneous cysts and their proper treatment is essential for maintaining the health and well-being of our furry friends. If you notice any unusual lumps or bumps on your dog's skin, consult with your veterinarian for proper evaluation and management.

Stress Fractures

Stress fractures are real fractures (breaks in the bone) that are all too common in today's athletes. The cause of stress fractures is usually found in the patient's history. The most common cause of a stress fracture is overuse. It can occur as a runner picks up their mileage too quickly or changes a running surface from soft to hard. Runners are particularly prone to lower extremity stress fractures due to the nature of the sport. Nutritional risk factors include lack of calcium, protein, and caloric intake. Tennis, basketball and volleyball players can get stress fractures of the feet, tibia (leg) or hip by playing too often. Intensity, frequency, and duration of an activity all play a role in the development of a stress fracture. Upper extremity stress fractures are seen in baseball pitchers, tennis players and softball pitchers. Rib fractures can be seen in crew athletes due to the excessive muscle pull of the serratus anterior muscle. Weight lifters, football linemen, gymnasts and soccer players are at risk for the development of lumbar stress fractures due to the mechanics of their sport, hyperextension of the lumbar spine. The primary symptom of a stress fracture is pain that is activity related. While x-rays are essential for evaluation of the pain, the actual fracture line may not be seen and additional imaging with bone scan or MRI may be needed for diagnosis. The treatment of the stress fracture is generally rest, however for certain fractures surgery may be necessary to avoid non-union (a non healed fracture). Nutritional and menstrual history is especially important for the female athlete. The female athlete triad; amenorrhea, poor nutrition and overtraining are associated with stress fractures and long-term osteoporosis. While athletes are often told "no pain, no gain," this adage is false when dealing with stress injuries. The best thing to do if one is experiencing progressive pain associated with their sport or activity is to rest and be evaluated.



Parkland Day, Saturday, March 9th

"It ends up being an all-day celebration of our City," said Mayor Rich Walker. "A day when Parkland remembers what it was and is grateful for what it has become." Walker said, "people love living in Parkland and we have plenty of events at which people see their friends and neighbors." "But Parkland Day is a celebration of why we come together and of why we hold family-friendly events, because we love Parkland," he said.

Last year's event was the first in more than a decade, it seems unlikely the City will go 10 years again without celebrating Parkland Day. This year's version will include that trademark parade that celebrates community, but there will also be plenty of community performances on the stage at the Amphitheatre at Pine Trails Park. In the afternoon and evening there will be a business expo featuring Parkland businesses, there will be rides, games, and play events for children, and there will be food booths throughout the day. In the evening a local band will provide the entertainment

People feeling at home and welcome at this event, as well as in the City in general, seems to be a theme. "If you've ever lived in Parkland, you know the feeling we're talking about, it's a special place," Mayor Walker said. "That's what we want people to feel at this event," he said, "whether you live here now or you lived here years ago and come back to attend Parkland Day, there's something special about this City and this event brings that out."

A beloved teacher for more than four decades, Mrs. Janet Bartoszek, also known as Mrs. Bee, was always an encouraging teacher when it came to reading. She tells us, "Cuddling with your children with books that they enjoy for 20 minutes a day, will impact their language development effecting their school achievement and their desire to be life long learners. Happy Reading!" Children who are encouraged to read get excited at things like the school book fair, trips to the library, and reading programs offered throughout Broward County. Having a kid-friendly library in your home is one of the best "play areas" to develop a child's curiosity and life skills.

Furthermore, BCPS has prioritized professional development for educators, equipping them with evidence-based strategies to support literacy growth. By emphasizing data-driven instruction and ongoing assessment, teachers can tailor their approaches to meet the needs of their students effectively.

The results of these efforts are evident in the reading proficiency rates of students in Parkland and Coral Springs. According to state assessments, a significantly higher percentage of students in these communities demonstrate proficiency in reading compared to national averages. This achievement reflects the dedication of educators, administrators, and community stakeholders to prioritize literacy as a fundamental skill for academic success.

In conclusion, the state of reading education in America is a complex landscape characterized by both progress and persistent challenges. While national trends indicate room for improvement, localized efforts in communities like Parkland and Coral Springs showcase the potential for meaningful change. By prioritizing evidencebased practices and fostering collaboration, educators and policymakers can continue to advance literacy outcomes for students across the nation.






